Teaching approaches towards the integration of iPod technology in the EFL classroom

During this symposium, four speakers address issues that teachers need to consider when integrating iPod technology. The first speaker explains how to use iPods to project audio-visual resources to students. The second speaker reflects on his experience to demonstrate how teachers can plan, organize and teach in an iPod environment. The third speaker discusses the use of iPods by Japanese advanced learners to facilitate their own linguistic development of the target language. The symposium concludes with a discussion for participants to deepen their interest in integrating iPods in their classrooms.
